Literacies are in the news

Not only do we have the Big Plus Campaign (see page 2) on the T.V. but Eastenders, the BBC Soap Opera, has introduced literacy issues into one of their character story lines. Kevin Miller, a fairly recent newcomer to Albert Square, has been exposed as not being able to read and he has been sharing his feelings about not being able to provide for his family as a result of this.

Never mind what you think about 'soaps' it does bring the issue straight to the heart of many households.

Spotting someone with literacy difficulties. How do we spot someone? What are the indicators which may require us to be sensitive to this? If you may be interested in getting training for your staff in literacies 'spotting & referring' then come along to the next meeting of our network.

What do we mean by literacies

It is *'The ability to read, write and use numbers to handle information, express ideas and opinions, make decisions and solve problems as family members, workers, citizens and life long learners'* (ALNIS Report 2001)

This tells us that literacy includes knowledge, skills and understanding. That these are all relevant in private, family, community and working lives. That such key life areas inform what has to be learned and that literacy and numeracy are employed for a purpose.

Scotland's Adult Literacies Curriculum

This is to be given a national launch in Edinburgh on Tuesday 3 May so look out for press coverage of it. The purpose of the new curriculum framework is:

- To promote a Scottish philosophy and approach to adult literacy.
- To show how it can be done with the learner at the heart of the process.
- To improve the quality of Scottish Adult literacy

Learning at Work Day

26 May is Learning at Work Day. It is an opportunity for organisations to show their commitment to staff development and give their workforce the opportunity to break from routine and learn something new. In 2005, Learning at Work Day will have four main themes:

Learning to Learn—the importance for employees and employers of considering how people learn most effectively, in order to make the very most of limited staff development budgets.

Skills for Life—the impact of limited basic skills on business effectiveness and on employees' own development.

Learning supporters—the potential of Union Learning Reps and other peer supporters in engaging and supporting workplace learners, especially if they're new to learning or doubtful about getting involved.

First line managers—the significant role played by supervisors and first line managers in supporting learning in the workplace, and how people in these roles can themselves be helped and supported.
