LINKS TO LITERACIES



Inaugral Meeting

The first meeting of the Falkirk Area network "Links to Literacies" meeting took place on Wednesday, 8th December 2004 at the Linked Work & Training Trust Offices in Grangemouth. Jacqueline McBeath of Learning Link Scotland gave a presentation explaining the aims, objectives and benefits of the project.

What is Links to Literacies?

Links to Literacies is a project which aims to increase collaboration between local Adult Literacies Partnerships and the voluntary sector, thus increasing the effectiveness of adult literacies services, and ultimately the number of literacies learners. It is one of the Literacies Pathfinder projects funded by Learning Connections (Communities Scotland). The project is a partnership involving Learning Link Scotland, Careers Scotland, CVS Network,

volunteer Development Scotland and West Dunbartonshire Council Adult Literacies Partnership.

Why should our organisation Participate?

As a voluntary organisation, you are concerned with the needs of your clients. Research has shown that there is a greater need for literacies provision among such groups as young people with chaotic lifestyles, ethnic minorities, those with disabilities or health problems, homeless people, unemployed adults, people with drug or alcohol problems, etc. If you are working with such a client group in many cases their needs will include literacy and numeracy development.

By being part of the Links to Literacies network, you will be kept up-to-date with local provision, especially the provision

that might be most helpful to your clients. You will also be able to have a voice on the local Adult Literacy Partnership, through your Link Worker. Thus you can ensure that provision really meets the needs of your clients.

As well as this you will have the prospect of receiving support, training, resources and development opportunities all of which might help you further improve the services you are delivering to your clients.

The Workers' Educational Association is the largest, national, voluntary sector provider of adult education in the UK. For over 100 years, the WEA has been active in communities and workplaces to ensure all adults have access to organised learning that can develop intellectual understanding and social or collective responsibility, whatever their starting point.

In the Falkirk area, WEA Scotland has the responsibility for promoting, and delivering, adult literacies learning in public, private and voluntary sector workplaces. Workplace literacies are the reading, writing, number, computing and verbal communication skills, knowledge and understanding that underpin so many of the jobs we do. 1 in 5 workers in Scotland may be struggling with the reading, writing, number skills they need to progress with confidence in their job or voluntary role and/or take up further learning.

The WEA Workplace Learning Tutor Organiser can offer a range of literacies learning opportunities, support and information, including:

- Awareness raising sessions for those who would like to find out more about the benefits of supporting their colleagues & volunteers through workplace literacies learning.
- Information and advice on how to make sure your organisation's documentation and publicity is user friendly and inclusive.
- Starting Points is a small group course that focuses on brushing up communication skills through choosing and researching a group project. Learners have the option of gaining SQA accreditation in Communication at Intermediate 1/ Access 3.
- Short, tailored courses and workshops can focus on particular workplace literacies needs or issues, such as reports, letter writing, filling in forms, producing effective publicity.

- WEA will work with you to develop the most appropriate learning options to meet the needs of your organisation and the individuals within it.
